

#### The Hundred Club of Greater Lansing Commemorates Four Decades of Giving

hen a police officer, firefighter, or paramedic dies in the line of duty, the surviving family is often in a state of shock and at a loss for what to do next. Their "whole world has been turned upside down,"



explained Suzy Carter, board secretary and executive director of the Hundred Club of Greater Lansing.

The Hundred Club of Greater Lansing has prepared for just such an event, with immediate financial assistance delivered within the first 48 hours. Club leaders meet with the surviving family to gift them a \$10,000 check that can be used for any imminent expenses, from funeral costs to airplane fare to mortgage payments.

"Our mission is pretty simple, and that's kind of the beauty of it and the sadness of it," said Carter. "We're there, ready to respond."

Insurance and government survivor benefits often take extensive paperwork and time to begin. The gift from the Hundred Club of Greater Lansing provides families with prompt, no-strings-attached aid in their time of grief.

"We know that this check that we deliver can help bridge that gap, at least for the next foreseeable future until they can get the rest of that stuff figured out," according to Ingham County Sheriff Scott Wriggelsworth, who serves as president of the Hundred Club.

The nonprofit Hundred Club of Greater Lansing was created by community members in 1984 in response to the death of East Lansing Police Officer James Johnson, who was killed in the line of duty while attempting to arrest an auto thief.

Since its founding 40 years ago, the Hundred Club of Greater Lansing has provided immediate financial assistance to 19 families of public safety officials who died in the line of duty within Ingham, Eaton, and Clinton counties. The most recent \$10,000 check honored Sergeant Bill Darnell, who served with the DeWitt Township Police Department for 20 years. He died in October 2020 of complications from a COVID-19 infection contracted while on duty.

The Hundred Club of Greater Lansing has 150 active members who commit to donating \$100 each year, Carter said. The club can also accept one-time donations of any

denomination by check or online.

Foremost, the funds are used toward immediate and as-needed long-term survivor assistance. Yet, over the years, the club's charitable reach has extended to a scholarship fund for heroes' college-aged children, a memorial wreath for the annual Michigan Law Enforcement Candlelight Memorial Service at the State Capitol, and partial scholarships for students enrolled in the Lansing Community College's police academy, and fire science or paramedic programs. The club has also given funds to public safety officials injured on- or off-duty.

The Hundred Club also issues awards for heroism and professional excellence to Tri-County Region

public safety officers at a ceremony held each spring. Nominations for 2024 will open in January 2025. The nominees tend to be recommended by their respective agencies, Wriggelsworth said, though the community is welcome to offer suggestions.

The awardees are recognized for achievements such as extraordinary valor, crime prevention, investigative activity, community relations, juvenile programs, drug prevention and control, training programs, traffic safety, and innovation.

Carter said the local Hundred Club is venturing into additional means of helping local public safety agencies, such as providing grant funds of up to \$10,000 for needed safety equipment.

"This is kind of a philosophical shift for us because we've always only supported line-of-duty death," she said.

Wriggelsworth said the grants will assist regional agencies with safety-related purchases that might not otherwise be covered.

"The club has come a long way in the last 40 years, and we're doing some different things," Wriggelsworth said. "We're trying to do some things more proactively to prevent tragedy as opposed to just reacting after the fact."


newly upgraded space, with its scenic views of the riverfront, offers a beautiful setting for event attendees to gather, relax, and network.

#### Leadership Lansing Launches its 10th Cohort

eadership Lansing has kicked off its milestone 10th year In October with a cohort of 43 leaders from a diverse group of organizations throughout greater Lansing. Leadership Lansing is a program sponsored by the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce (LRCC) and is designed to develop and equip the next generation of community leaders. The eight-month program runs each year from October to May. In the first nine years of Leadership Lansing, 344 outstanding leaders from around the region have completed the program.

"We didn't know what to expect back in 2015 when we launched Leadership Lansing. Frankly we were hoping to have 15 or 20 people so we could make a go of it," said Tim Daman, president & CEO, LRCC. "We had 33 people sign up for that first cohort and it has been growing ever since. We are thrilled that we have been able to meet a need that our members have to help develop their talent and get them more deeply connected into the Greater Lansing region."

The 2024-25 Leadership Lansing program commenced on October 22 with an opening night dinner at R.E. Olds Museum, a fun and informative way to get to know fellow cohort members and learn more about the region's strong connection to the automotive industry. The following day, participants enjoyed a Strengthfinder's training where they learned how to more effectively leverage their strengths at work. LRCC President & CEO Tim Daman was the season's first 'Lunch with a Leader' speaker and shared his thoughts on leadership both for individuals and for the region as a whole. The group also enjoyed a tour of the Lansing Board of Water and Light's (BWL) Dye Water Conditioning Plant. Many thanks to BWL Chief Operating Officer Dave Bolan and his team for organizing and leading the program.

Leadership Lansing exposes its participants to important leadership and community issues through a combination of guest speakers, panel discussion, field trips and individual leadership training. ## Jane Mitchell was a hairstylist with a library card in the early 1990s.

With two school-aged children, she wanted to shift careers to avoid working nights and weekends. So Mitchell went to the library and studied *Entrepreneur Magazine* booklets about starting a home-based business.

"I just flipped through the pages until I found something that sounded interesting," Mitchell said.

With help from the Small Business Development Center in Lansing, Mitchell created a business plan for the 1994 launch of Cards 4 You, in which she sent thank-you notes and holiday cards on behalf of corporate clients.

"At the height of my card-sending business, I was sending about 20,000 to 30,000 Christmas cards for other businesses every year and about 900 thank-you cards a month," Mitchell recalled.

The business evolved as clients asked to send chocolates and other promotional items with their greeting cards. Her branded merchandise became more popular, so Mitchell changed the name to Tarzan Promotions in 1998. After a cease-and-desist letter from the Edgar Rice Burroughs' estate alleging "Tarzan" trademark infringement, the business name swung to Jungle Jane Promotions in 2011.

Mitchell continued to grow Jungle Jane Promotions by seeking out mentors – she was the 2012 ATHENA

PowerLink recipient – and through education, earning her Master of Advertising Specialties in 2014 by completing more than 200 hours of training.

Today, Jungle Jane Promotions works with businesses and organizations throughout the Greater Lansing region to create award plaques, trade show tote bags, logoed t-shirts, drinkware, and office supplies, among other products. She's brought her son and son-in-law into the business with an eye toward succession planning.





And along the way, she's found time to give back to the community. Mitchell serves on the board of the grief support nonprofit Ele's Place and is a member of the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce and the Rotary Club of Delta-Waverly. She was inducted into the Michigan Promotional Professionals Association's Hall of Fame in 2022.

In recognition of her lifetime of achievements,

Mitchell is the 2024 ATHENA Leadership Award recipient, as named by

the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce. She will formally receive her award at the annual ATHENA Lansing Celebration luncheon on Thursday, December 5th, at the Lansing Center.

The ATHENA Leadership Award honors leaders who excel in their careers, dedicate time to their community, and mentor women in their professional ambitions.

Mitchell said she feels privileged to receive the 2024 ATHENA Leadership Award, especially as it puts her in esteemed company.

"It's very prestigious," Mitchell said. "I've been in business for 30 years and watched a lot of other ATHENA winners and been to a lot of the events. So to think that I would get asked to be in with that same group of people is really quite an honor. I don't think enough people realize how special this is." Stella Cash, who was the 2012 ATHENA Leadership Award recipient, was among those who nominated Mitchell for this year's award. Cash said she met Mitchell by way of Women Working Wonders, an all-volunteer committee of the UM Health-Sparrow Foundation.

"She's always willing to help out, sometimes with jobs that nobody else wants to do. She's creative and very philanthropic," Cash observed. "And I thought, this woman has a story. I want to get to know her."

"She is a self-made woman living the American Dream," said Cash. "So many of us go to college, and that opened the doors for us. Jane created her

door and opened it."

Michelle Massey, who received the 2021 ATHENA Leadership Award, agrees that it took a lot of "stick-to-it-ness" for Mitchell to persevere in an often maledominated business climate.

"It took a lot of advocating for herself and for her business," said Massey, who met Mitchell through mutual professional networks. "She shows that you can be an entrepreneur based upon your dreams, your desires, and hard work."

As vice president of community and customer operations for software company TechSmith, Massey became a client of Jungle Jane Promotions about a year ago.

"You want to make sure that employees have access to good swag and merchandise. It's really important to be able to rock your brand,"

Massey said.

Massey said Mitchell has been able to create unique merchandise that hits the mark, often on a tight deadline.

"From a business perspective, she listens, she takes what you need under consideration and she will make it work for you and your business so that you can be successful," Massey said. "It's about making you feel

valued as a customer. I know that
I am not her biggest client. I know that
I am not a client who has been with her the
longest. Yet she treats me just as if I was."

Mitchell puts that same effort into her community work, lending her talents to business organizations and events throughout the Lansing region.

"It's those little things that keep your loyalty, that make you proud to be a part of this community," Massey said. "She's quietly behind the scenes, making sure that her business has a strong foundation and is continuously giving back to our community. I think that's how greatness is built."

#### ATHENA PowerLink Award Recipient Jacqueline Taylor: Early Childhood Education Advocate Grows Local Presence

The Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce has named Jacqueline Taylor, owner and founder of Lansing's Little Dreamers Daycare Center, as the 2025 ATHENA PowerLink Award (APL) recipient.

APL is a national mentoring program connecting women business owners with their own dream team of advisors. The

Lansing-area advisory panel will donate an estimated \$25,000 worth of business consultation services over the next calendar year to help Taylor attain the next level of her daycare's success.

Taylor began Little Dreamers in 2015 as a home childcare provider with six students.

"So I grew from a family facility to a group, and then from a group to a center in 2021. It's been a beautiful process of growth," said Taylor. "We are in this very fragile but exciting time in our business. I've grown things as far as I know how to do on my own, so I'm excited to have this wise council."

On November 1st, Little Dreamers Daycare Center held a ribbon-cutting ceremony to unveil the recent expansion of its facility on S. Waverly Road, growing by 3,000 square feet and three classrooms.

The larger space means the daycare can increase its child headcount from 30 to 60. Taylor and her team are working through the student waiting list while hiring and training an additional 15 employees. Before the expansion, Little Dreamers had 13 employees.

"We're excited to welcome more families," Taylor said.
"I'm really passionate about bringing high-quality, early childhood education to our community."

Little Dreamers Daycare Center is licensed to care for children from birth to 12 years old. The latest business expansion means the daycare will be able to offer beforeand after-school supervision, as well as drop-in services.

"We're trying to be creative about solving the needs that our community has," Taylor said.

Over the course of her career, Taylor has become an advocate for early childhood development in the Greater



Lansing region, emphasizing the need for young learners to have access to play-based curricula, nutritious meals, and comprehensive support for families.

In October, Little Dreamers hosted state legislators and the nonprofit Early Childhood Investment Corp. to discuss the systemwide needs of childcare professionals in Michigan.

"We want to continue to be a part of the solution because we recognize that — not just in Lansing, but really in our country — we're having an issue with childcare."

Mitchell said her involvement in the local business community means her Jungle Jane Promotions clients can always count on her to do her best work.

"I'm going to see you at every event I go to, so I'm not hiding," Mitchell said. "It's all about the family and all about the relationships."

Industrywide, the most popular logoed merchandise tends to be shirts, bags, and drinkware, Mitchell said. But with more than a million printable products on the market, Mitchell said she likes to think "way outside the box." The craziest product she's helped create: personalized urinal screens.

"I did a really good campaign for a guy who had a cab company. He put, 'If you're leaning on the wall, call a cab.' So, if it's your niche and that's what you need, then that's perfect," said Mitchell. "There's so much out there, and there's no reason to just always do the same thing."

As for her own marketing, Mitchell's business card is a microfiber cleaning cloth.

"I set myself apart by doing different stuff," she said.

When she's not consulting clients on the best products for their promotional budgets, Mitchell is often riding bikes with her husband of 43 years, Ken. They like to travel and have visited 48 states so far. They also travel to watch their four granddaughters in sporting events. Mitchell enjoys crafts, family game time, and cruising in the couple's Corvette.

Mitchell said Jungle Jane Promotions has given her the flexibility to raise a family while growing a company she hopes will last for generations to come.

For others who might be considering entrepreneurship or even a big career change, Mitchell suggests tapping into the local business community for guidance. ATHENA Women's Interest Network, the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce, and the Small Business Development Center are all excellent resources, she said.

"I would say, figure out what you want to do, do the research, and get experts in that field or in the business community to help you to figure it out," Mitchell said. "There are people who are so willing to help. Most people love to see other businesses succeed."





Lansing Regional Chamber-PAC Celebrates Success in November 5 General Election

he Lansing Regional Chamber-Political Action Committee (LRC-PAC) is proud to highlight its remarkable success rate in the November 5th general election. In this election cycle, the LRC-PAC endorsed 44 candidates across federal, state, and local levels, including positions for the U.S. Senate, State House, County Board of Commissioners, Sheriff, Prosecutor, and the Lansing Community College (LCC) Board of Trustees. Of these endorsed candidates, 42 achieved victory, resulting in an outstanding 95% success rate for the LRC-PAC. Below you will find additional information on election results at the federal, state and local levels.

#### **Key & Notable Highlights**

#### **Federal**

- U.S. Senate: Elissa Slotkin defeated Mike Rogers in a historic close race, with Slotkin receiving 48.6% to Rogers' 48.3% (2,708,212 - 2,687,995). This marked one of Michigan's closest U.S. Senate races.
  - U.S. Senate is now under Republican control with a 52-47 majority, with one race (Pennsylvania) still uncalled.
- 7th Congressional District: Tom Barrett defeated
   Curtis Hertel Jr., 50.3% to 46.6% (226,694 209,842).
  - U.S. House of Representatives retained Republican control with 218 seats needed to maintain the majority.

#### **State**

- State Representative Angela Witwer won with 52.1% to 47.9% (28,210 – 25,954).
- State House of Representatives flipped to Republican control, creating a divided government in 2025.

#### Local

- Delhi Township Supervisor John Hayhoe lost his reelection bid, marking a significant loss for Delhi Township's leadership.
- Clinton County Board of Commissioners retained a Republican majority.

- Eaton County Board of Commissioners retained
  - a Republican majority.
- Ingham County Board of Commissioners **retained a Democratic majority.**
- All four endorsed candidates for the Lansing Community College Board of Trustees were victorious.
- All endorsed public safety officials, including
   Prosecutors and Sheriffs, were successful in
   their elections, ensuring strong leadership for law
   enforcement and community safety across the region.

#### **Local Proposals**

- Passed: Ingham County Housing & Homeless Millage with 62% support.
- Defeated: Ingham County Lodging Excise Tax Increase (59% against, 41% support).
  - Despite being a tax on visitors, this proposal was not supported by voters.
- Defeated: Eaton County Tax Limitation Alteration Proposal (51% against, 49% support).
  - The LRCC supported this proposal and has formally requested Eaton County establish a financial health team, inspired by Lansing's successful model, to address potential financial distress concerns.

## Advocating for Business: LRCC's Role During Michigan's Lame Duck Session

uring the Michigan State Legislature's Lame Duck session — the period between the election and the start of the new legislative term — lawmakers often address complex or time-sensitive issues. The Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce (LRCC) public affairs team is hard at work on your behalf, collaborating with business coalitions and trade associations to advocate for practical solutions, defend business interests, and improve the regulatory environment. The LRCC's mission is to ensure you can continue to operate your business effectively while contributing to a thriving Michigan economy. Below are some of the top legislative priorities the LRCC is focused on during this critical period:

#### 1. House Bills 6056-6057 - Legislative Fixes to Paid Sick Leave and Minimum Wage/Preserve Tip Credit

 Support: HB 6056 introduces gradual minimum wage increases while preserving the tip credit system through 2029, balancing workforce needs and business sustainability. HB 6057 refines Michigan's paid sick leave laws with clarified definitions and employer-friendly provisions, creating a more predictable and manageable framework for businesses.

#### 2. Senate Bills 1079-1080 - Workers' Compensation Adjustments

Oppose: These bills could raise workers'
compensation costs for businesses, creating
unnecessary financial and administrative
burdens. We are actively advocating for practical
reforms that ensure fair compensation without
overburdening employers.

#### 3. "Polluter Pay" Legislation (e.g., SB 605-611, HB 5241-5247)

• Oppose: The LRCC is a member of the Retain Brownfield & Urban Investment Coalition (#RebuildMI), opposing proposed changes that would impose overly strict cleanup standards and extend liabilities, hindering redevelopment efforts and discouraging economic investment. We are actively working to defend policies that promote growth while supporting a balanced and practical approach to environmental stewardship."

#### 4. Bad Faith Legislation (e.g., HB 4681)

 Oppose: Proposed changes under this legislation would increase processing costs for claims and create inefficiencies. The Chamber, in collaboration with the Don't Touch MI Rates Coalition, is advocating for regulatory consistency to ensure a fair, predictable environment for businesses.

#### 5. Senate Bill 228 and House Bill 4359 - Repealing Local Regulation of Plastic Bags

 Oppose: These bills could lead to inconsistent local regulations, complicating compliance for businesses operating across jurisdictions. The Chamber supports uniform statewide standards that provide clarity and efficiency.

#### 6. House Bills 6108-6111 - Sand and Gravel Mining Regulations

 Support: These bills streamline permitting processes, create consistent statewide standards, and balance environmental needs with economic growth.

in the DEI category. Okemosbased marketing communications firm **Publicom Inc.** provided the campaign's strategy, execution, and video production.


